PUPPY MILL AWARENESS DAY - SEPTEMBER 15

Puppy mills are nothing new. These mass dog breeding operations have been around for decades. They continue to thrive because they prey on consumers who are smitten by too-cute-for-words puppies in pet store windows and on fancy internet sites. But behind the friendly façade of the local pet shop, the pastoral scenes on a breeders website, or the neighborhood newspaper ad, there often lies a puppy mill. These canine breeding facilities house dogs in shockingly poor conditions. Life is particularly bad for "breeding stock", dogs who live their entire lives in cages and are continually bred for years, without human companionship and with little hope of ever becoming part of a family. These dogs receive little or no veterinary care and never see a bed, a treat or a toy. After their fertility wanes, breeding animals are commonly killed, abandoned or sold to another mill. The annual result of all this breeding is thousands of puppies, many with behavior or health problems.

Several hundred thousand puppies are shipped cross-country to be sold in pet shops but many are sold in newspaper ads or internet sites and are often accompanied

by false claims such as "We'd never sell puppies from a puppy mill" or promises that the puppies are "home raised", "farm raised" or "raised with kids/ grandkids". The ploys of the puppy mill are designed to dupe a well-intentioned family into buying a puppy and keeping the engine of cruelty working overtime.

Because a puppy mill is a business, they are designed purely for profit, not for the well being of dogs. Laws are on the books to provide minimum care standards but enforcement has been spotty at best. The USDA licenses and inspects for violations of the Animal Welfare Act. But puppy mills can successfully navigate around these laws simply by selling directly to the consumer or avoiding the reach of law enforcement who are understaffed and overworked.

With millions of unwanted dogs and cats dying every year in animal shelters, there is simply no reason for animals to be bred and sold for the pet-shop trade. Without these stores, the financial incentive for puppy mills would disappear and the suffering of these dogs would end. The best way to find an animal companion is through an animal shelter or rescue group.

Please don't buy animals from pet shops or breeders. Each puppy purchased from a pet shop, a backyard breeder or from the internet serves an industry with no conscience. Thousands of unwanted animals of all ages and breeds are euthanized every day. Adopt and spay or neuter a rescue companion to help break the cycle of suffering, misery and death.

OFFER PROPER DOG TOYS

When you are looking to keep your dog entertained, you'll find that toys are very important. Like children, dogs love to play and need to be stimulated and having the right toy to play with and chew on is good for them. You should never give your dog an old shoe or shirt to play with. They will assume any shoe or any shirt is appropriate.

Remember, just because your dog wants to play with it, doesn't make it a great toy. While dogs love things with buttons, string, ribbon and rubber bands, any of these things can be a choking hazard to your dog. Just because a ball is too small for your dog, doesn't mean he won't want to play with it. It could become lodged in his mouth or throat. Similarly, bones might count as toys but if he chews them up and swallows a lot of splinters, he could end up with gastrointestinal distress and be in a fair amount of pain.

So what kind of toys are good for your dog? The first type are hard plastic toys that are good for playing fetch. They will be too large for your dog to swallow and too tough for him to rip to bits. Rope toys that have been knotted to prevent fraying are another good choice. And while dogs love tennis balls, they can be a choking hazard for large or even medium sized dogs.

Some dogs love having soft toys to cuddle or to satisfy their "kill" instinct. If your dog only wants to carry it around, make sure it's small but not small enough to be a choking hazard. If he loves to pounce on it and shake it, try to find a toy that is about the size of prey they would naturally chase.

Take some time and really consider what toys are going to be healthy and stimulating for your companion.
